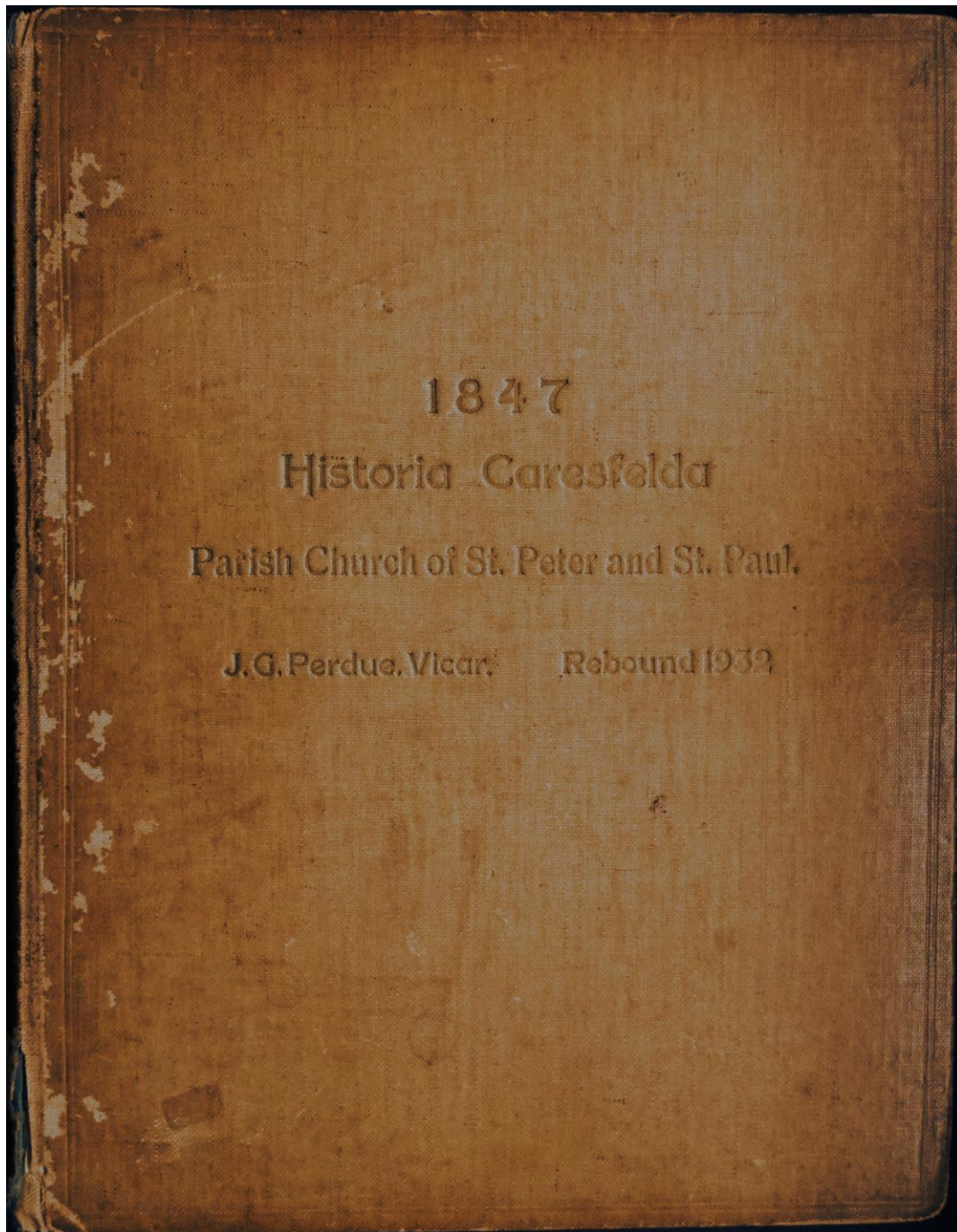
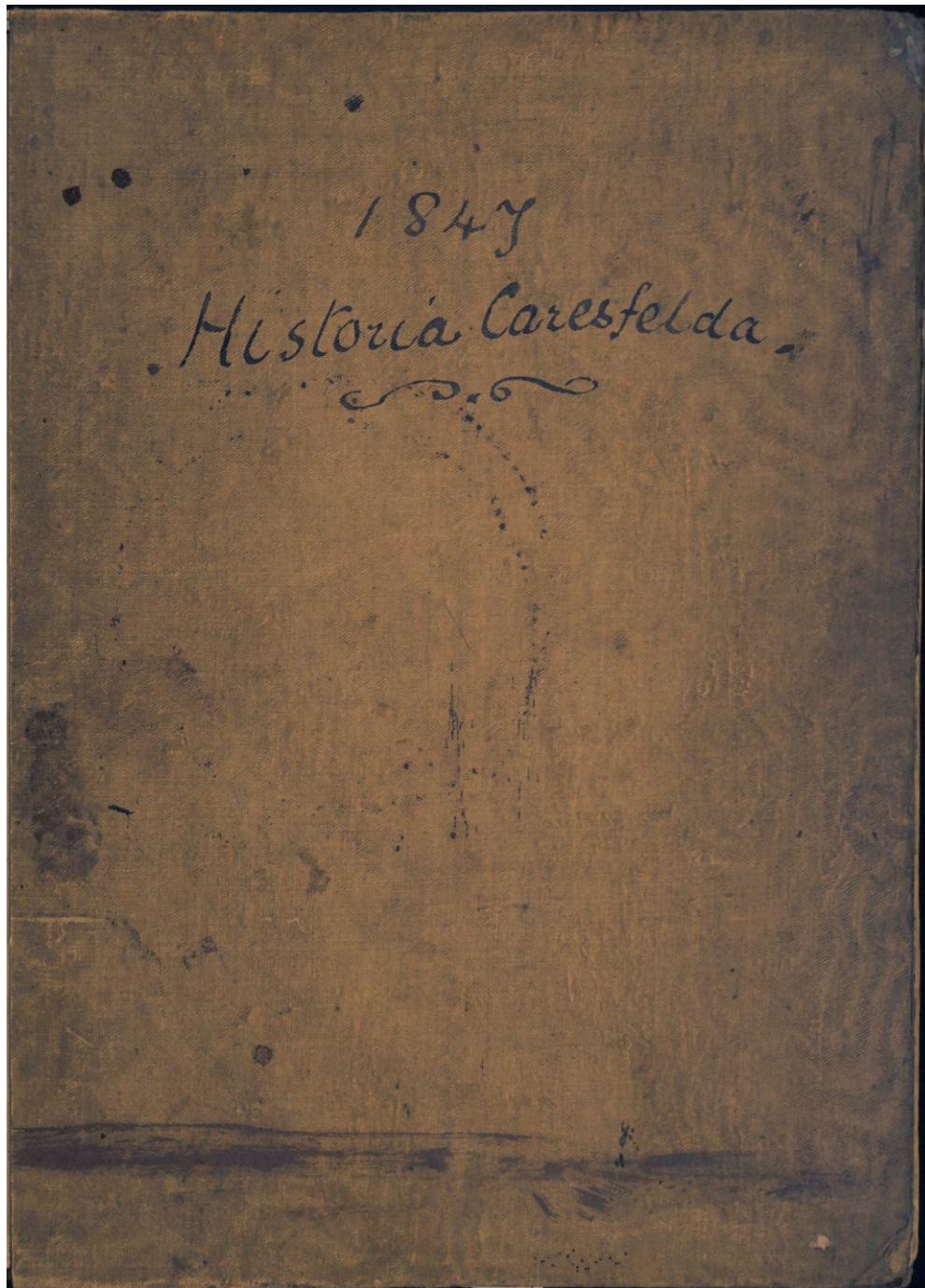




Front cover (4mm board) from the rebinding in 1932. Note that Church name includes St Paul.

The succeeding Incumbents of the Parish of Charsfield are requested to take care
of this Book as long as it lasts.

1. The **First** written page – a dedication (Sept 1847) by **Edward Dunthorne (ED)** who was an amateur antiquarian and grocer at Dennington. This was addressed to the Revd Bransby, the resident village minister at the Old Parsonage in Charsfield.

Below the dedication is a request in a different, but (likely) Victorian hand, for succeeding “*Incumbents ... to take care of this Book*”.

At the top in pencil, is an intriguing reference to two manuscript collections in the British Museum (now in the British Library) - that of **David Elisha Davy**, renowned Suffolk antiquarian, and the priceless national collection of **Robert Harley**.

Church Restoration.—The parish church of Charsfield, Suffolk, has been thoroughly restored in commemoration of the Queen's Jubilee. The work comprises complete cleaning, repairing, and colouring the walls with oil-colour staining, and varnishing all the pews, laying tiles of artistic patterns on the centre part of the chancel, constructing new vestry, and new heating apparatus. The church has been furnished with new altar, and new altar cloth, from Messrs. Jones and Willis, London. Trees have been planted, and the paths in the churchyard done up with gravel from Malton and Ufford. When the year, the Rev. Joshua Davies, spoke first of church restoration, all the church people were faint-hearted about it, but he took all the responsibility at once on himself, and has carried it out to a successful issue. The Rev. Joshua Davies was for nine years curate in charge of St. Stephen's Church, Pittgwenly, &c. &c. A. S.

2. A page originally blank, likely filled in the early 1900s. The four brown rectangular papers match to the wording on the **four shields now in the church nave**; each relates to one of the four main family dynasties that were Lord of Charsfield Manor from the 1100s (see page 10).

The newspaper cutting at the bottom describes the restoration done to Charsfield Church at the time of **Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897**.

A short account of the Parish of

CHARSFIELD

*in the County of Suffolk,
from the earliest times*

Domesday: Carsfella or Caresfelda.

Charsfield is a pleasant village lying 6½ miles north of Woodbridge, and about 6 miles S.S.W. of Framlingham, is in the Hamlet of Looe, and Liberty of St Ethelred, and Division of Woodbridge. Its population in 1801, 411, in 1831, 553 and in 1861, 551. The Rt Hon^{ble} W. Greville, Earl Howe is Lord of the manor and patron and improver of the benefice, which is a Perpetual Curacy of the value of £160 a year, of which £27 arises from Queen Anne's Bounty; but his Lordship has generously, within the last two or three years, augmented it to £100. The whole Parish contains 1299 acres 2 roods and 4 poles of land, of which 716^{ac} 0. 23^{po} belong to Earl Howe; the Rectorial Tithes on 571^{ac} 3^{po} have been commuted for £160, the remainder is merged in his Lordship's estates here. The Rev^d William Blomfield Brassey, is the present incumbent.

The materials for the early history of Charsfield are scanty. It is very probable that Roger Bigot was chief Lord of this Parish when Domesday was taken, for we find that several persons held lands here at that time, although no Manor is mentioned; but as the Manor was afterwards found to be held of the Castle of Framlingham, and as Roger Bigot was at the survey one of the Tenants here, as well as Lord of Framlingham at the time, the greater probability is that Roger Bigot was Lord 20 William I. (1086).



In Pope Nicholas IV. Ecclesiastical Taxation about 1291, the Church of Charsfield was valued at £8 and a portion of Tithes belonging to Ely Cathedral at 16^s, this Taxation of Pope Nicholas is a most important Record, because all the Taxes as well to our Kings as the Popes were regulated by it, until the survey made in 26 Hen VIII, and because the Statutes of Colleges which were founded before the Reformation are also interpreted by this Criterion according to which these Benefices, under a certain value are exempted from the Restriction, in the Statute of 21 Hen VIII, concerning pluralities.

As an historical record relating to this Place may be mentioned the Inquisition of the ninth, in the time of Edw III. who being at war with Scotland and France, the Parliament on 23 March 1340, granted him a subsidy of the ninth and fifteenth of their grain, wool and lambs. The following was the Inquest or Taxation of Charsfield in 14 Edw III. 1341, before the Abbot of Leiston and others

3. Here is the first page on the **history of the village**, all in **ED's** neat hand. He cites the village name as Caresfella and Caresfelda, both from the Domesday Book, though that has 9 variations of the village name in total, plus Parvacaresfella (Little Charsfield).

Note the family shields drawn here. **ED** drew and sketched well and was an expert on heraldry and family trees.

Deed of the Right Honourable Richard Penn & Earl Howe and the Honourable George William Penn

Dated 14th April 1883.

The Right Honourable Richard William Penn & Earl Howe and the Honourable George William Penn Esquires commonly called Viscount Curzon under authority of an Act passed in the 5th Year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria intituled an act to afford further facilities for the conveyance and endowment of sites for schools and of the act of the 5th Year of the reign of Her Majesty explaining the powers and of other authorities and powers as hereinunto enabling do hereby fully and lawfully and without valuable consideration according to our respective estates and interest and so far as we are lawfully can or may grant and convey but not further or otherwise unto the Reverend Robert Hender pro cur Archdeacon of Suffolk, Edward Gwynn Esquire Patron of the living of Charsfield in the county of Suffolk and Vicar of Charsfield in the said Parish of Charsfield and to their co-heirs and assigns David Medcalf Vicar of the said Parish of Charsfield and to their Successors. All that parcel of ground in the Parish of Charsfield bounded on the east by road leading to the said County of Suffolk on the North by land in the possession and occupation of the said Edward Gwynn Hodgson on the South and West by the said land in the possession of Barkly Esquire and in the occupation of E. Gwynn, Wm. Brock and H. Brock the said parcel of ground not exceeding one acre in extent (which said premises are delineated in a map drawn on the margin hereof) to hold the same unto and to the use of the Robert Hender pro cur, Edward Gwynn Hodgson and David Medcalf and their Successors for the purpose of the said act and upon Trust Subject nevertheless to the provisions hereinafter contained to permit the said premises and all buildings thereon erected or to be erected to be for ever hereafter appropriated as and for a school for the education of children & adults or children only of persons residing in the Parish of Charsfield aforesaid and as a residence for the teacher or teachers of said school and for no other purposes in which said school religious instruction shall be given in accordance with the principles of the Church of England.

Provided always and it is hereby declared that the said R. H. Gwynn, E. G. Hodgson, D. Medcalf and their Successors shall and may from time to time and at any time hereafter grant and convey for educational purposes but not otherwise to any body corporate or bodies corporate or persons authorised by law to accept the same the whole or the estate or interest hereby vested in them or any smaller interest in the said school in such manner & upon such terms as to them may appear fit. Provided always that the vicar of Charsfield for the time being shall have power to hold a Sunday School in the school premises of which the entire control and management shall be vested in him and that he shall have power also to use the school premises when not required for school purposes for the holding of meetings of a religious moral and instructive character. In witness whereof the parties to these presents have hereunto set their hands and seals this 14th day of April 1883.

The above was extracted from the copy of Deed of Grant Still Existing & Preserved in the
Lincoln's Inn.

4. Originally a blank page (see "Vide Page", top left); later someone has inscribed a copy of a Deed of 14th March 1883.

In this Deed, the Penn/Curzon family (ex-Lords of the Manor) passed trusteeship of the **village school** and its land into more local hands, namely – Archdeacon of Suffolk, Patron of the Living (E.G. Hodgson), Charsfield Vicar (Revd Medcalf).

The Deed is repeated in a more readable form on page 46.

"Hund of Los. Curfeld with the Vicarage
extended to fifteen marks."

"The Jurors say that the north sheep, fleece, and lamb of the aforesaid Village are valued at 100 shillings and no more, because the rector of the same place hath 60 acres of Land valued per annum at 60 shillings at 12 per acre, of the tenth of Milk valued per annum 25 shillings; of the tenth of Flax and Hemp valued per annum 5 shillings of rent of assize 19 shillings of tenth of Hay and Mill valued at 10 shillings per annum. Examined by Henry Twindin, Roger Gissing, John le Gros and John Lovel, jurors of the said Village."



In King John's time, that is from 1199 to 1216 the Lordship of Charsfield was vested in William de Weyland, who was fined for his villains, here and in Westerfield.

In 53 Henry III. 1259, John de Weyland, his son had free warren here, at whose death the Lordship of this place descended to his son.

Sir William de Weyland Knt. who died 2 Edw. I. 1274, which then became the property of his eldest son.

Thomas de Weyland, and in 13 Edw. I. 1285,

Sir Nicholas de Weyland, second son of Sir William, had free warren here.

In 19 Edw. II. 1325, Sir William de Weyland Knt. son and heir of Sir Nicholas had also free warren here, and who died 1 Edw. III. 1327, to whom succeeded,

Sir Robert de Weyland Knt. son and heir of Sir William. Cicely, wife of Sir Robt died 7th Richard II. 1386, he was succeeded by

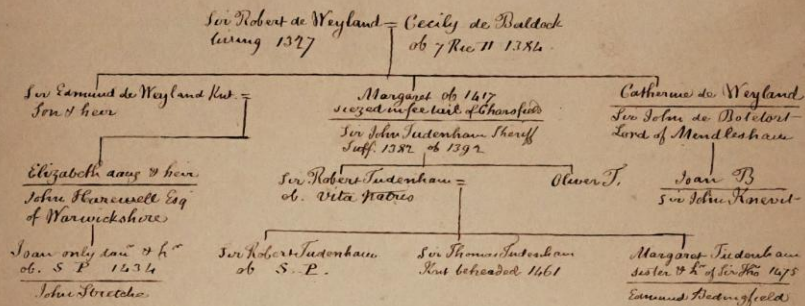
Sir Edmund de Weyland Knt. his son and heir, whose only daughter & heiress Elizabeth, inherited this Manor. She married John Harewell Esq. of Warwickshire, and Joan their only daughter and heiress, married John Stretche Esq. of Devonshire.

Thus Joan Stretche it appears died without issue and her possessions devolved upon the descendants of Margaret and Catherine, sisters and co-heirs of the said Sir Edmund de Weyland, grandfather of the above Joan. Margaret married to Sir John de Tudenham, who died in 1392, and Catherine to Sir John de Botetort Lord of Mendlesham in Suffolk.

In 1434, on the death of Joan Stretche a fine was levied between Robert Tudenham Esq. grandson of the above Sir John Tudenham and Margaret his wife, and Sir John Knevet, who married Joan, daughter and co-heiress of Sir John de Botetort and Catherine his wife, by which the manor of Charsfield, with Brandeston, Westerfield and other Lordships in this County were granted to the said Robert Tudenham; and the other possessions of the said Joan in Somersetshire &c. to Sir John Knevet as in the following table of the descent.

5. The second page on the **village history**. The paragraph at the top refers to the "**Inquisition of the ninths**" adjudicated in 1341 for Charsfield in the presence of the Bishop of Leiston.

The history continues with the **de Weyland family** (see their shield drawn on the page) as Lords of Charsfield Manor, but via the female line this passed onto the **Tudenham family** in the 1400s.



The Lordship of Charsfield appears to have been in abeyance, but to have been held by Sir Robert Tudenham Knt. son and heir of Sir John de Tudenham Knt. and Margaret his wife, he succeeded his father as Lord, by whom it came to his Son & heir.

Robert Tudenham Esq who dies without issue in he was succeed by his brother and heir

Sir Thomas Tudenham Knt. succeeded his grandmother Margaret in the paternal and maternal estates; she being seized in fee tail of the Manors of Charsfield, Mundeston, Grundisbury, Bealings Magna Tudenham and Wetherfield. Sir Thomas by taking part with the house of Lancaster, against that of York, was convicted by Parliament of Treason, 1 Edw IV. 1461, and beheaded; where by part of his estate descended to Margaret Bedingfield, Widow, then 60 years of age, who died in or about 15 Edw IV. 1475, seized of this and several other Lordships. She was relict of Thomas Bedingfield Esq. whose Will was dated at Bedingfield in 1451, and directed his body to be buried in the Church-yard there. Margaret his wife was buried at Ereswell. Her will dated 1474, wherein she gives to the Church of Bedingfield 16*l* 8*s* for a Vestment in memory of herself and ~~husband~~ ^{husband}. In 1475, on the death of Margaret, the Lordship of this place appears to have been in possession of



Sir John Wingfield Knt. who died 21 Edw IV 1481. he married the daughter of Sir John Fitz Lewis Knt. by whom he had twelve sons and three daughters his eldest son heir.

John Wingfield Esq held the same on the death of his father. The Porch of the Church of Charsfield appears to have been built or repaired by the Wingfields. from

Page 6 on the left-hand side is blank.

7. The third page on the **history of the village**. The **tree** shows how the manor lordship passed to the Tudenhams.

However, **Thomas Tudenham** took the side of the Lancastrians when the Yorkists were in the ascendancy, was convicted by Parliament in 1461 and beheaded. Part of his estate and Charsfield's lordship went to his sister Margaret, widow of Edmund Bedingfield.

On Margaret's death in 1475, the **Wingfield family** take possession of the lordship (maybe just in a caretaker role). They build/repair the **brick church porch** (and, we also know, provide fine communion silverware).

(a) Upon a closer inspection of the Font, it does not relate to the Wingfields.
The figure is a winged Lion or Dragon, emblematical of St Mark.
The Arms of Wingfield are only a pair of wings in base, on the shield.

(b) A rich and very beautiful Monument on the South side of the Church of St Michael's
Church, Crooked Lane, London. The Isle is called Fishmonger's Chapel, the Monument has
the following Inscription. (Harris's Survey of London continued by Seymour,
folio Vol. 1 page 1177.)

8. A page (on the left-hand side) interposed between the third and fourth describing the village history. Perhaps this was, at first, blank then inscribed later by **ED** with:

(a) a note that the font “does not relate to the Wingfields”.

(b) a monument inscription from St Michael's, Crooked Lane, London praising **John Leman**, who bought the Charsfield Manor Lordship in 1613 and died 1632.

Edmund Bedingfield, Esq. of Ereswell, son and heir of Thomas Bedingfield the son and heir of the said Margaret, for aiding the house of York, obtained of King Edward IV. a grant of the estates forfeited by the attainder of Sir Thomas Tudenham. He died about 1503, leaving issue Thomas (Sir) Robert and Edmund.

Sir Thomas Bedingfield Knt. son and heir, he was succeeded by

Sir Thomas Bedingfield Knt. son and heir.

Sir Henry Bedingfield Knt. son and heir of Sir Thomas, held his first Court here 1553, and was succeeded by his son and heir

Sir Edmund Bedingfield Knt. who, 2^d Eliz. 1560, held the Manor of Charsfield Hall, at half a Knights fee, and paid Castle guard rent to Framlingham Castle.

Sir Thomas Bedingfield Knt. son and heir, held his first Court 28 Eliz. 1586. He died 1590, his son and heir.

Sir Henry Bedingfield Knt. kept his first Court for this Manor in 1591. He obtained a grant of the Lord of the Manor of Framlingham, that the Manor of Charsfield should not in future be holden of Framlingham by Knight's service, but by fealty only. In 11th Jac. 1613, he sold the Manor of Charsfield, Charsfield Hall, and the demesne lands thereto belonging, to



Sir John Leman, who was Sheriff of London in 1606, and Lord Mayor in 1616. Sir John Leman acquired an estate of £4000 per annum; was knighted by King James I. in 12th of his reign, 1614, and the same year held his first Court for this Manor. He bought the Manor of Warboys in Huntingdonshire, from Sir Oliver Cromwell. He also purchased lands in Framlingham and other parts in Suffolk; and by a deed dated April 7 1629 he settled the Charsfield estate upon William Leman Gent. (eldest son of John Leman of Beccles, eldest son of William Leman gent. of the same place, who died in 1627, the eldest brother of Sir John) and his heirs for ever. Sir John Leman died 26th March 1632, and was buried in St Michael's Church Cooched Lane-London, where an elegant Monument was erected to his memory. He was a considerable benefactor to the City.

William Leman Gent. after the death of Sir John, kept his first Court for

9a. Fourth page on the history of the village. The **Bedingfield** family obtain the lands forfeited by Sir Thomas Tudenham and retain the lordship of Charsfield until 1613 when it was sold to **Sir John Leman** (Sheriff of London in 1606, Lord Mayor in 1616).

In the 1590s, Sir Henry Bedingfield managed to have abolished a fee ("Knight's Service") that had been paid by Charsfield Manor to Framlingham Manor over many centuries.

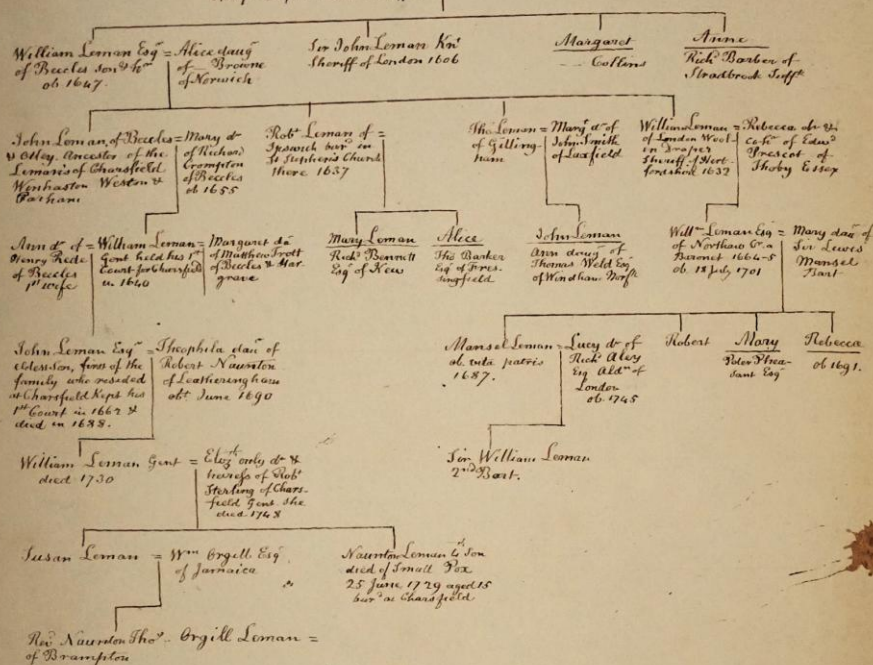

9c. Here, on the back page of the letter, the writer (**Lumsden Bedingfield**) takes issue with some of the information set down by **ED** – both dates and the line of succession. He cites at the very end the interesting fact that Sir John Leman had been a prominent fish monger in London.

In 1902, W. J. Leman Esq. of the Lincolnshire branch, restored the marble monuments of the Leman's family on the north side of the chancel, & defrayed the expense of having various coat of arms mounted on old oak & fixed on the walls of the church.

10. A detailed tree of the Leman family by **ED**. Note that it starts with John Leman of Gillingham (Norfolk) and Beccles (Suffolk). It was a son of his, **Sir John Leman**, who purchased, in 1613, Charsfield Manor, which he later **bequeathed to the Beccles strand of the family** (shown on the left-hand edge of the family tree).

William (d.1730) and Elizabeth (d.1748) were the last couple to own the Manor and reside in the village. She was from the Starling/Sterling dynasty, the other wealthy family in the village, living at the "White House".

The later-added paragraph at the bottom tells that the Leman family in 1902 restored the **marble monuments in the Chancel** and paid for the **four wooden shields** in the Nave (see Page 2).

John Leman Esq. eldest son by his first wife Anne daughter of Henry Rede of Beccles. He was the first of the family who resided at Charsfield, and kept his 1st Court in 1662, and died 6 January 1688. He married Theophila daughter of Robert Naxton of Leotheringham Suffolk. His eldest and youngest sons after his decease without issue leaving their brother who succeeded

William Leman Esq. who married Elizabeth the only daughter and heiress of Robert Sterling of Charsfield Gent. eldest son of George Sterling Esq. of this place, a family of good repute here for several ages descendants of the Sterlings of Wimbesham and ^{Loringham}. In or about 1735, the said Elizabeth as widow of the above William, inherited this estate. The Lordship and estates then became by purchase the property of



William Jennens Esq. of Acton Place Suffolk, whose father Robert Jennens Esq. was Aid-de-Camp to the great Duke of Marlborough, who married Anne daughter and heir of Gervase Guidot Esq. and died in 1725. William his only son and successor was baptized in 1701 and King William III was his godfather. He was afterwards page to Geo I. He finished the splendid mansion called Acton Place which was begun by his father Robert Jennens. During the long period of his life he remained a Bachelor; at the period of his decease he was accounted the richest Commoner in England.

He died June 19th 1798, and intestate; his remains were interred in the family vault in Acton Church; on opening which the coffins of his father and mother only were found therein, the former of whom had been buried 71 and the latter 37 years. Mr Jennens' own aunt was mother to William Hamner Esq. of the Penns; who married his first cousin Miss Jennens of Gopsall co. Leister by whom he had a daughter Eliza

She in 1756, married Asheton, afterwards Lord Viscount Curzon, by whom she had a son the Honorable John Asheton Curzon, who married Lady Sophia Charlotte Harcourt Howe, and died in 1797 leaving

George Augustus William Curzon, who was born in 1788, & became heir at Law to all the real estate of Mr Jennens. He died in 1808 when his brother

Richard William Penn Curzon Viscount Curzon assumed the name of Howe, and was created Earl Howe 14 July 1841. His Lordship was born 11 Dec 1756, married 19 March 1820, Harriet Georgiana, 2nd daughter of Robt 6th Earl of Cardigan

11. Fifth page by **ED** on the history of the village, completing the account of the Leman family

Around 1735, **Elizabeth Leman** (née **Sterling**) inherited, then sold the Lordship to **William Jennens** of Acton Place. Reputed to be the richest commoner in England, and known as William the Miser, he contrived to die **without his Will being signed**. Though contested for over 100 years, his wealth was early on passed to his relatives. In particular, Charsfield Manor went to **Richard William Penn Curzon**, later **Earl Howe**.

Vicars & Perpetual Curates of Charsfield.

Vicars

Robert Large 1635, he was ejected about 1646, for reading the Book of Common Prayer, and for taking the solemn league and covenant with limitations; he became afterwards in such abject circumstances, as to accept of an asylum in the stone house at Letheringham, where he and his family obtained a constant supply of provisions from the Abbey. He died in 1657, and was buried in Letheringham Churchyard.

John Robert Hodgson became Churchwarden in 1823 during the Ministry of the Rev Wm Brown afterwards Rector of Marlford. He was succeeded by the Rev Wm Hallett, the Rev Rinkham, the Rev Whalley, the Rev Thobald, the Rev Wm. Bransby just died & R. R. R. 1858. He was the first resident Clergyman for many years for him Lord Howe made the House habitable, and increased the stipend to £100 a year. The Rev R. R. R. was just 1868 & resigned 1865, on a 24 Aprilth he was instituted to the Rectory of Linton & Norwich.

* Joseph Kersey bequeathed by Will, in 1816, the sum of £800 to be applied in the purchase of Bank Stock, the yearly interest thereof to be distributed in Bread & Coals, to the resident industrious poor of the Parishes of Dallinghoe, Charsfield, Marlesford, and Earl Soham, for ever. With this Legacy £832. 18. 4 new four per Cent annuities were purchased, so that each of the four Parishes received £8. 6. 7 yearly.

The Rev David Medcalf succeeded Mr. Weston, he officiated for the first time on June 2^d 1865 (Whit Sunday) was instituted by the Bp of Norwich on June 12th & read himself in the following Sunday, June 19th.

Trustees of Mr. Kersey's Charity - Capt Kersey of Dallinghoe - Suffolk - Farmer - Peter Steptoe of Debenham Suffolk - Farmer - Jonathan Davis of Titchingham Suffolk - Farmer - The last surviving Trustee Mr. died when the money was made over to the Charity from misprisoners.

However, the full-width paragraph ("John Robert Hodgson) has been inserted by another circa 1860 and provides detail **on Ministers from 1823** until that time.

Two further paragraphs at the bottom have been added, one noting Rev David Medcalf's arrival in 1865 and the other naming the Trustees of Kersey's Charity.

THE CHURCH

The Steeple built with red brick, the top of which is double embattled, and ornamented with flint and free stone, and contains five bells. The Nave and Chancel built with stone and plastered, and covered with tiles. The Nave of the early perpendicular style; no side aisles. Porch on the South side, is of brick and slightly ornamented. In the grandeur of the door, alternately, a pair of wings in leure. The whole building is of the perpendicular style.

The Gallery at the West end of the Nave is very plain. The Kings Arms, Geo III. over the Belfry window. One small lancet shaped window on the North side, and a small one on the same side stopped up, of this shape.



A rude window of three lights at the East end of the Chancel. The Altar neat at first, but is now much faded. Two windows on the South in the Chancel. Nave and Chancel of the same width. Pulpit and reading desk on the South side of Nave, and a window of three lights, and another of two lights near the gallery. A modern light in the Steeple door.

The Font octagonal, at the west end of the nave, was once very handsome, but the figures much battered and broken. It has a Dragon in one compartment and alternately the upper half of Angels. A door on the North side and opposite the Torch door. On the South side, in a pew, is a coffin shaped stone. Some remains of incrustic tiles in the floor of a seat by the porch. Opposite the reading desk, on a small oblong free stone.

The small N Chancel Window is of great Antiquity, a rude Norman light of 13th Cent. The walls of the Chancel appear to have been taken down several feet, consequent on decay in 17th Cent and a roof of inferior design and workmanship placed upon them. The roof of Nave remains as in pre-Reformation times save that all the faces of the carved

13. A description of Charsfield Church by ED starts here. He also seems to be the one to have drawn the carvings found at the base of the church tower (though a later hand has added the sentence above, indicating where the carvings are).

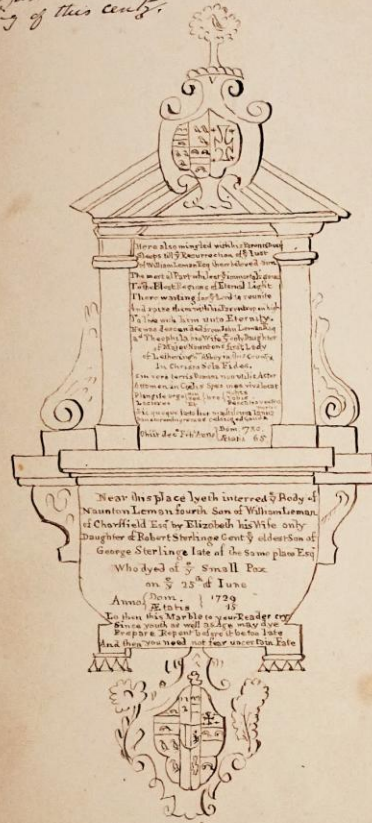
Note that one carving shows the name Paul, perhaps an indication that the church was **originally dedicated to St Paul as well as St Peter**.

ED comments on the mutilation of the font, likely done in the mid-1600s.

The inscription "J.G.R 1822", we now know refers to the Charsfield landowner, **John Rainbird**, whose "Low Farm" later became Shrubbery Farm.

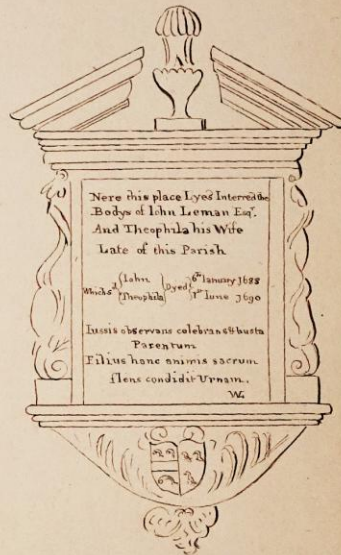
The bottom paragraph, commenting on the construction of the Chancel and Nave, has also been added later.

cherubim have been mutilated, these no doubt at the same time that the figures on the font were destroyed. The old rood screen appears to have been cut up and a portion used in the construction of the present screen - remains of the old rood loft stairs seem to exist in the N. wall of the church & to have been filled in with rubble in 17th cent. The Church was despoiled of property at the time value of £200 most probably conveyed to altar furniture - The ancient altar candlesticks were in use at a farm house as far back as the beginning of this century.

The Flagon is of very ancient workmanship bearing date 1576 and no doubt presented to the Church by the Wingfield family. The tower is a fine structure 70 feet high and most substantially built remaining of 15th century work. The ancient stone work of the West door most likely formed the stone jambs and arch of the old West door of the nave before the present tower was built. The third bell bears a very singular date viz 1660. The Public bell presented by Lennan family has the crown broken -

that Board.

The later inserted lines at the top of the page refer to the discovery in 1889 of the previously unknown **ancient rood stairs** in Charsfield Church, blocked up in Reformation times.

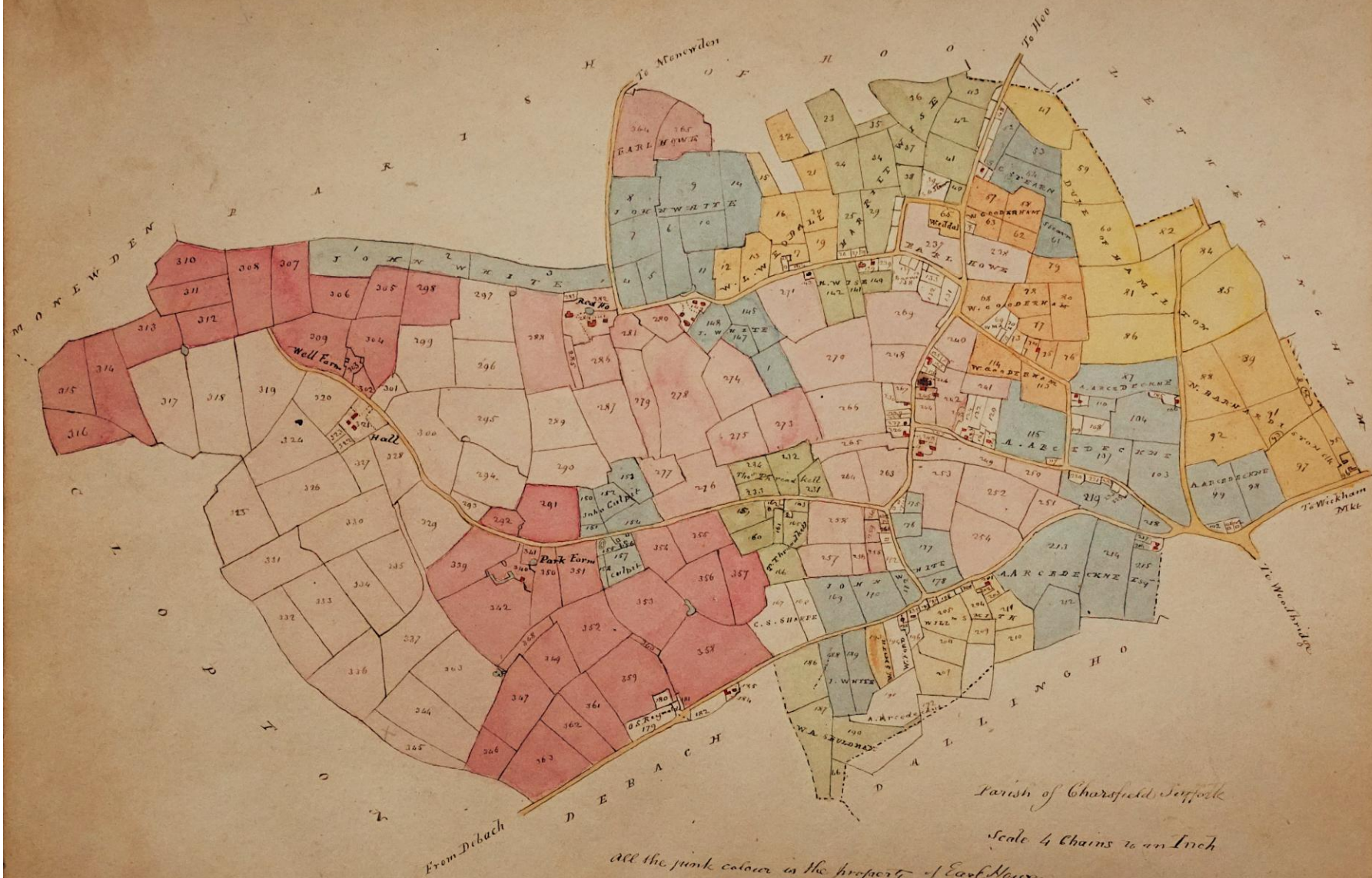

In the autumn of 1860 the second year of the Rev^d Frederick Weston's incumbency the old parsonage with the grounds were gratuitously made over by the patron Earl Howe, to the Commissioners of Queen Anne's Bounty fund, who pulled down the old building and erected the present one at a cost of about £800; £200 being allowed for the old materials & other kindred disbursements, and a few private subscribers lending their assistance. The Rev^d F. Weston continued to reside here until April 1865.

On the 21st of August 1863, a sad catastrophe occurred in this parish, on a small holding situated near the road leading from the Churchfield & Hor Road towards Burnmow, and at that time belonging to the Incumbent of Chillesford. A steam engine employed in threshing, suddenly exploded, and instantly killed three persons, Samuel Denny a native of this parish. A man named Nathaniel Licenss from Wickham Market, and a boy from Camperley Rk. Denny's lifeless body was soon found, a few yards from the spot, very much blackened, but not dismembered, all his bones however appeared to be broken. After much searching for two or three hours, a charred snap bearing some resemblance to a lump of coal, was raked from the fire, it was almost difficult to recognize it as a portion of a human body, but singular to say, there still remained a small portion of Licenss's clothes, and a part of his coat pocket containing his tobacco box.

The remains of the boys body were afterwards recovered from the fire, presenting a most horrid sight. The roasted remnant still retaining the human shape, in a shape ghastly beyond description. Mr. Walter Birch the occupier of the place was seriously hurt in the head, and two other men were besides. Others received great injury, but happily recovered after a few days. — Large portions of the engine, were thrown by the force of the explosion from two to three hundred yards, one large portion of the fire box being estimated to weigh nearly a quarter of a ton. Being about a mile distant when the accident took place, the report seemed like that of a large cannon. Immediately after, I saw a dense mass of black smoke ascend, as in an instant more, the barn, and stacks, and everything on the place were all on fire. The fire from the engine being scattered over the whole. The threshing machine was almost smashed to atoms, nothing remaining but after the fire but the iron-work bent and twisted into all manner of shapes. Some of the timber of the barn, which in the barn was not burnt under the surface, but so smoked as to be useless. For three or four days, hundreds of people came from miles around, to view the sad spectacle. H.C.

In the summer of 1864, the old pews, gallery, altar piece and other dilapidated fittings were removed, and the church entirely re-seated and otherwise repaired and improved at a cost of £124. After being closed about two months it was re-opened on the 27th of September by the Bishop of Norwich. The following is a list of the subscribers.

In the month of May 1866 the handsome Stone Reredos was erected in the Church, the cost £21 being very generously defrayed by Earl Howe, who also at his sole expense built the School House which was opened on the 10th of March 1868 the day of the prince of Wales's wedding. Lord Howe gives the Rent of the House and of a little more than an acre of land, and £5 annually towards the support of the school £5 a year for coal, and £5 annually to the clothing club. Vide Page 2. Lord Howe gave £10 towards the Harmonium which was opened April 15th 1868, the remainder of the cost (£22) being subscribed chiefly by the parishioners. The School up to 1884, had been kept as a Dunces school, and there were an attendance of 25 children.

- Up to **1884**, school had been kept as a Dunces school. In attendance some 25 children.

We the Right Honourable Richard William Penn 3rd Earl Howe and The Honourable George Richard Penn Curzon commonly called Viscount Curzon under the Authority of an Act passed in the 5th year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria intituled an act to afford further facilities for the conveyance and endowment of sites for schools and of the Act of the 5th year of the reign of Her Present Majesty explaining the same and of all other authorities and powers us hereunto enabling do hereby freely and voluntarily and without valuable consideration according to our respective estates and interest and so far as we lawfully can or may grant and convey but not further or otherwise unto the Reverend Robert Hindes Esquire Archdeacon of Suffolk, Edward Gowing Hodgson Esquire Patron of the living of Charsfield in the County of Suffolk and Vicar of Worwich, and Reverend David Medcalf Vicar of the said Parish of Charsfield and to their Successors. All that parcel of ground in the Parish of Charsfield bounded on the East by the road leading to Aso in the said County of Suffolk on the North by land in the possession and occupation of the said Edward Gowing Hodgson on the South and West by cottages and land in the possession of Barkly Esquire and in the occupation of G. W. Wain, W. B. Bock, and H. B. Bock the said parcel of ground not exceeding one acre in extent (which said premises are delineated in a map drawn on the margin hereof) To hold the same unto and to the use of the said Robert Hindes Esquire, Edward Gowing Hodgson and David Medcalf and their Successors for the purposes of the said Act and upon Trust Subject nevertheless to the provisos hereinafter contained To permit the said premises and all Buildings thereon erected or to be erected to be from hereafter appropriated as and for a school for the Education of Children and Adults or Children only of persons residing in the Parish of Charsfield aforesaid and as a Residence for the Teacher or Teachers of said School and for no other purposes in which said school religious instruction shall be given in accordance with the principles of the Church of England.

Provided always and it is hereby declared that the R. H. Esquire, E. G. Hodgson, D. Medcalf and their Successors shall and may from time to time and at any time hereafter grant and convey for educational purposes but not otherwise to any body Corporate or bodies Corporate or Persons authorised by Law to accept the same the whole of the estate or interest hereby noted in them or any smaller interest in the said school in such manner and upon such terms as to them may appear fit. Provided always that the Vicar of Charsfield for the time being shall have power to hold a Sunday School in the School Premises of which the entire control and management shall be vested in him and that he shall have power also to use the school premises when not required for school purposes for the holding of meetings of a religious moral instructive character. In this deed, the Penn/Curzon family (ex-Lords of the Manor) passed trusteeship of the village school and its land into more local hands, namely – Archdeacon of Suffolk, Patron of the Living (E.G. Hodgson), Charsfield Vicar (Revd Medcalf).

Note: This appears to be the last of the original pages.

Subsequent pages were presumably added when **Historia Caresfelda** was rebound in 1932.

WOODBIDGE FIELD CLUB.

Another benefactor seems to be represented on a panel of the font, on which is the carving of a figure holding a church. The reredos is curious but not handsome. A small narrow lancet window in the north wall appears to be the oldest feature of the building.

After visiting the church, Mr. Hodgson allowed the visitors to inspect his interesting collection of old china and family portraits; one is that of his grandfather, a former rector of Long Melford. Before departing all present accorded the Rector and his wife a most hearty vote of thanks for their kind hospitality and welcome.

Dallingshoo Church contains good specimens of early wood-carving; but the piece which especially deserves attention is that forming the back to the pulpit and which is adorned with the Tudor rose, the arms of England and France, and the pomegranate of Catherine of Aragon, which fixes the date of the workmanship to be about 1500. The tower, once central, is now at the east end of the church, owing to the loss of the chancel. There is but one bell; it has the inscription, "Miles Grays made me 1622." The Rev. A. Brooke-Webb allowed his visitors to view his well arranged gardens, now possessing a most pleasing appearance. The excursion was thoroughly enjoyed; Woodbridge was reached at 7.30 p.m. before the shades of evening fell.

The next outing may possibly be on Wednesday, June 8th, to Framlingham. Mr. Garnham has consented to take members by road for 3/6 each, but notice of arrangements will be sent by the hon. sec., Mr. V. B. Redstone, Mill Hill, before the date fixed.

A printed report from a journal or magazine has been **glued in** on the left side. This tells of a visit by the **Woodbridge Field Club** to Boulge, Charsfield and Dallingshoo on Wednesday May 25th. No year is given, but from the names of Church Ministers given in the article, it must have been 1898, 1904 or 1910.

The inclusion of this article was probably because the Club members conclude from their examining of the **carvings at the base of Charsfield tower** that the church was originally dedicated to **St Paul as well as St Peter**. This dedication to the two Saints appears on the front cover of the rebound Historia Caresfelda.

Other observations in the article are also of significant interest.

WOODBIDGE FIELD CLUB.

Appointment of The Rev. John George Perdue, Master of Arts, Trinity
College, University of Dublin. October 1927.

Patron Miss Emily Whicker, Brook House, Charsfield.

The Vicarage and grounds were in a dilapidated condition. Weeds grew to the doors and the lawns had been run-moss. No care had been given for many years.

The Church was in a deplorable state, shabby and neglected. The plaster on the walls was dropping off: guttering was missing. The foundations were grown in with nettles and weeds and the stone work perished. The Mullions in the Tower windows were falling and there were many holes in the walls.

The Churchyard was overgrown with weeds and nettles and fallen Tombstones lay in every direction.

With undaunted courage and energy the Parishioners took the matter in hand. Working parties were formed in which men, women and children joined. Garden Fêtes were arranged and with such success that in four years the scene was transformed.

During that period the Church was made safe for generations to come: the walls refaced: new stone for that which had decayed: new cement foundations: new bricks of proper type replaced the old where needed: the mullions of the Tower windows rebuilt and oak louvres placed in position.

This work was mainly done by James Pemberton and son: a family which has been connected with the Church and Parish for many generations.

A new parcel of land had been given by Mr E. Hodson of Charsfield Hall to form an addition to the graveyard.

Paths in it were opened and old paths renewed.

The road wall of the Churchyard was also repointed and oak posts supplied for the gate.

47c. The first written entry on the pages added at the rebinding. It refers to the **great village revival** at the end of the 1920s and the first part of the 1930s, specifically on this page:

- The restoration of the vicarage and its grounds which had become dilapidated.
- The restoration of the church, new stone and brick.
- The churchyard road wall repaired.
- The churchyard extended (on the east side).

This all occurred after the arrival of the **Revd John Perdue** as vicar in October 1927.

Turning to the Vicarage grounds: a garden was made and borders planted. The waste land below the Vicarage was broken up and by many willing workers Tennis grounds were made and a Sports Club established.

The Charsfield and District Nursing Association was also started with Mrs Perdue as first Hon. Sec. and Treasurer.

The past great need was then supplied by the generosity and public spirit of Wilfred H. Youngman, Esq., of Charsfield Hall who built at his own expense a splendid brick Village Hall and let it at a small rent to the appointed trustees to be used for all good purposes for the Parish life without restriction.

Mrs Emily Whicker, the past private patron of the living, gave a chiming clock for the Church tower as her memorial in the Church and Parish she loved.

The valuable Church plate was handed in to Barclay's Bank in Woodlodge for safe custody and a plain silver service given for customary use by the Vicar, his wife and Min R.M. Ann, I.P., as a thank offering for many blessings.

The Chancel of the Church was then considered.

A portion of the ancient Rood Screen had been found and the Parochial Church Council determined that it should be replaced and that new choir stalls, replicas of XIV Century work should be carved and a suitable Chancel formed to the Glory of God.

The carving of the bench ends was entrusted to a local craftsman Mr Lanman of Framlingham and the benches and floor made by James Pemberton and son.

The Church is greatly beautified by this excellent work and photographs of the Bench ends are here inserted.

Appointment of the Rev Sidney Osborn M.B; Ch.B. Edin.
1932 Patron: Wicken College

Dr. Sidney Osborn was a medical Missionary for many years with the Methodist Church. He was ordained a priest in the Church of England and served Curacy at Bramford in this Diocese. He was a keen scouter and had a flourishing troop.

The Pulpit in Charsfield Church was obtained and adapted for use by Dr. Osborn from the Church of St. Margaret, Ipswich. It was covered with black enamel and had a huge pedestal on which it stood. Dr. Osborn reduced it from an eight sided pulpit to a five sided pulpit and removed the pedestal. He also removed all the black enamel and the then Rector of St. Margarets was so amazed when he saw the "transformed" pulpit that he wished they had never parted with it. Canon Batterby a subsequent Rector of St. Margaret's told the Revd. D. W. Ellis Jones that he too wished they had never parted with it. But here in Charsfield the pulpit has come to stay and is much valued.

Dr. Osborn went back to medical work in Ipswich during the 2nd World War. He was a tall dignified figure, very quick moving, with rapid strides. He became increasingly deaf and felt it was not right to have another parish. But at his death in 1962 he was in charge of St. Lawrence and St. Stephan Ipswich and much beloved. May he rest in peace.

50. Brief biography of Revd Sidney Osborn, appointed as Minister at Charsfield in 1932.

This includes an account of the arrival of the new pulpit, obtained from St Margaret Church, Ipswich, much modified and then installed on the south side of the church (the previous one had been on the north side).

*Appointed to the Living of the Rev. Maurice Gray Newton
M.A. Oxon March 1939 - Patron. Martyrs Memorial

Mr. Gray Newton exercised his ministry at Charsfield at a most difficult time in the history of our Country, namely during the 2nd World War. The parish was bombed and had a devastating incendiary raid. The work of the church was much curtailed. Many were away on active service and others came for a time as evacuees from London.

Mr. Newton was a devout conservative evangelical and many thanked God for his ministry. He was, however, impeded from getting about as he had been a cripple from his youth. He did good work for the church in a most difficult time of national and world upheaval. He has subsequently been incumbent in several parishes. One was in Chichester and he is now Incumbent in a country parish in Essex. (1962)

The Living of Charsfield was vacant for two years after Mr. Newton left. The reasons for this were - the living only had £76 real Endowment Income, and it was not until Mr. Crowther Smith left the Rectory of Monewden for Sudbury that the Diocesan Bishop Brook was able to join the three parishes of Monewden, Hoo and Charsfield together and they were held by the Revd. D.W.Ellis Jones "IN PLURALITY" under a Faculty from the Archbishop of Canterbury.

The other reason for Charsfield being without an Incumbent for so long is that during the Sequestration the mains had been left connected and on, and the pipes burst. Water flowed through the ceilings and throughout the house for many days before it was discovered.

The Surveyor of Deben Urban District Council had to issue special permission for the house to be entirely redecorated and ceilings renewed where necessary. To say that the house was in appalling condition is to put it mildly.

51. Brief biography of Revd Maurice Gray Newton, appointed as Minister at Charsfield in 1939.

Revd. D. W. Ellis Jones - Vicar 1945 to 1962.

The Revd. D.W. Ellis Jones was a Graduate of Queens' College Cambridge and Ridley Hall Cambridge. His particular interest in Diocesan life was the Rural Deanery of Loes, of which he was Rural Dean for ten years. He was a member of the Diocesan Education Committee and the Diocesan Pastoral Committee. He was Secretary of the Adult Further Religious Education Committee of the Diocese. Also a member of the Executive Committee of Diocesan Missionary Council.

During the Incumbency of the Revd. D. W. Ellis Jones in the years following World War II, there were great changes in personnel and in the methods of Farming. In 1945 most residents of Charsfield, Monewden & Hoc were in some way related or had resided for a number of years in the same place. Increased transport meant that Charsfield became more and more a "dormitory" of Ipswich and Woodbridge. Two and three dwellers being turned into one house as the population declined. In 1945 one farmer only had a very small combine but rapidly the farms have become mechanised. Larger farms have absorbed the smaller ones and this has been the pattern of change from 1945 to 1962.

The open air services at Regatontide have been appreciated. There has been a happy understanding with the Baptist Church. The United Remembrance Service has been held in the Parish Church and we have joined each other on weeknight Harvest Services.

One feature during the years has been the joint Choirs of Monewden and Charsfield leading Hymn Singing Services which have had their value.

The Church Army have held Missions.

Students from Cuddesdon Theological College also visited the parishes for a most inspiring time of visiting and services. One of the Students, the Revd. R. Scruby is now Rural Dean of Portsmouth. (1962)

During the Incumbency of the Rev. D.W. Ellis Jones, the Vicarage has had to have the central wall underpinned, and the kitchens have been modernised and a new cloak room has been installed down stairs. Not only have the Church Commissioners helped in this respect but the Vicar has also spent a considerable amount on maintaining and redecorating the house.

A growing interest in the valuable Secular Church Silver was aroused by the visit of Mr. Grimwade of Christies to ask for three pieces of silver for the Exhibition at Christies for the Historic Churches Preservation Fund.

The simple Parish Communion service with hymns has been valued once a month in the three parishes. It has been a joy to serve God in this beautiful church and parish and Deanery. As one has entered into the inheritance which past generations have built and now hand on to my successors, I am reminded how valueless is our 'little day' except from God the Creator and Sustainer. "Except the Lord Build the House, they Labour in vain that build it".

Revd. D.W. Ellis Jones was inducted Rector of Trimley St. Martin 28.6.62

The Revd D.W. Ellis Jones was a Graduate of Queens' College Cambridge and Ridley Hall Cambridge.

THE BAPTIST CHURCHES

ASSOCIATION MEETINGS AT CHARSFIELD - 1880

The annual meetings of the Suffolk and Norfolk Association of Baptist Churches commenced at Charsfield on Wednesday. The Baptist Church in this village has been established upwards of 100 years; the centenary services were held last year. The chapel is one of the old type common in Suffolk villages—a square building, capable of seating 400 persons. At present there is no settled pastor; hence it was rather a courageous undertaking to receive and entertain the Association; but, with a good strong Committee, superintended by Mr. John Symonds, one of the deacons, and ably supported by willing helpers, the work has been done. It is 27 years since the Association last met at Charsfield. The fine tent, capable of holding 2,000 persons, was erected in a meadow kindly lent by Mr. E. Brooks, as was also the tent for dining purposes.

The services commenced on Wednesday morning, presided over by the retiring Moderator, Pastor Chilvers, of Ipswich, who conducted the devotional service. Through twelve months, he said, they had been kept, and, like as the Pilgrims of the Lord that went up to Jerusalem, so had they come up to praise the Lord. During the year come had passed away; to these he paid a tribute of respect and love.

Mr. William Ling (Ipswich), secretary of the Association, spoke of the persecution of the Baptists in Russia, and contrasted with this state of things the privileges possessed in this land, and the happy gatherings they held. Abstracts of letters from the following churches were read—Wattisham, Beccles, Rattlesden, Friston, Laxfield, Waldringfield, Gosport, Cranford, Stoke Ash, Puffham St. Mary, Sutton, Rushmore, Charsfield, Tunstall, Fressingfield, Horwist, Aldrich, Norwich, Bradfield St. George, Stowmarket, Mendlesham, Blakenham, Reddingham, Ipswich (Bethesda), Otley, and Clonham Ferry; from these Churches came 34 messengers, in addition to the pastors. Many of the letters were of a hopeful and encouraging character; in some places there was an increase of membership; other Churches had to deplore a languishing state; yet the village Churches were "holding the fort," and exercising a power for good. The tabulated statistics showed that 10 churches had received, by confession of faith, and by transfer to 11 Churches had transferred to other Churches 21; the dead in 17 Churches numbered 34; in the Sunday Schools there are 1,988 scholars and 236 teachers, and in Bible classes 494 members. The retiring Moderator (Pastor Chilvers) said his relinquishing his year of office, he was glad he had had an opportunity of visiting many of the Churches; he had found life among the people—a people worth visiting.

Pastor William Dixon, of Bradfield St. George, the Moderator for the coming year, in his introductory remarks, referred to the 27 years which had passed since the Association last met at Charsfield; very few then present were there at that day; they had passed away. He considered that the Association was a part of the Nonconformist body, and as such they were sorry the Licensing Bill was not passed; but they were pleased the Old-age Pensions Bill had become law. As Nonconformists they did not agree to a State church as by law established, but what they believed was a Church as set forth in the New Testament. The keynote of his address was "The Church and the Kingdom," which he ably argued out. The Church in Scripture was mentioned but few times—the Kingdom many times. Some were trying to run the Kingdom on the Sermon on the Mount, and shed round and shouted for eight Dreadnoughts. Some tried to run the Kingdom on creeds; this could never be done. Some found fault with the methods of spending the Home Mission money, and never gave a collection towards the object. The great work was the conversion of the people. Satan had access to the Kingdom; in every Church there were some tares as well as good seed. The Kingdom is not of this world; it is the Kingdom of God in the soul. It was an able and practical address, listened to with evident pleasure and profit.

An adjournment was made for luncheon, when the large tent was filled. The tables were decorated with red and cut flowers; the waiting was excellent, and reflected the highest praise on the committee of management.

The afternoon service was presided over by Pastor Haddock, of Stowmarket. Pastor Tooke, of Stratford, read the Scriptures, and Pastor Josiah Morling, of High Wycombe, led in prayer. Pastor Chisnal, of Guildford, was the preacher, and his text was from Exodus xxi.

This followed, and was largely attended and efficiently served, and many happy reunions took place. In the evening the sermon was preached by Pastor Flegg, of Houlston.

THE FIRST TEST.

ENGLAND'S CHANCE.

RHODES INVITED.

To-day the eyes of all cricketers are turned towards Birmingham, where the flower of English and Australian cricket meet in friendly antagonism in the first of the five test matches. The results of the games played by the Colonials so far have not tended to encourage the thought of their ultimate triumph, for not only has their bowling been regarded as something less than formidable but it has been doubted whether their batting was altogether satisfactory on certain wickets. The English side enter upon their task with a certain confidence with which is mixed a wholesome respect for the visitors, for Antipodean elevens have always played up finely. We shall discover in the next three days whether the present team is equal in that sense to the fine companies of cricketers who performed such doughty deeds in bygone years.

Although the men from "down under" gave the home champions a good game on the occasion of the first of the real test matches in 1880, it was not until Murdoch's great side came in 1882 that it was conclusively shown that the players from the other side of the world were the equals of the home exponents. In that summer of uncertain weather and soft wickets, the Australians were able to count upon the hitting powers of such mighty hitters as Bonner, Massie and McDonnell. These great batsmen were reinforced by Murdoch, Horan, and S. P. Jones, Blackham kept wicket, and the bowlers included Boyle, Garrett, Palmer, Giffen and the incomparable Spofforth. What a galaxy of stars! Whether any team from Australia has since been quite so strong has been often debated, and the consensus of opinion is in favour of Murdoch and his merry men, who were a band of geniuses all at the zenith of their powers and at the summit of their form. For the first time in history England lost the laurels in a test match; the visitors emerged as victors at the Oval by the narrow margin of seven runs. It is true that the defeat was amply avenged two years later, when three test games were for the first time arranged; but the 1882 tour brought lustre to Murdoch, one of the most brilliant cricketers of all time, and the men who so splendidly supported him. It was in that season that the Australians for the first time played exclusively eleven-a-side matches, and they lost but four of 38.

The feature of the encounters of 1884 was that although England won at Lord's by a very comfortable margin, matches at the Oval and at Manchester were drawn, thus beginning that long series of indecisive meetings which has marred the history of test games in this country. Nowadays, when the number of test games has been extended to five, the arrangement is that if the last match determines the rubber it shall be played to a finish. In 1886, when the Australians were weakened by an accident to Spofforth, George Giffen was the one great genius of the side, whereas England had Grace, Sheelshury and A. G. Steel at the height of their skill, while Lohmann, A. E. Stoddart and Briggs were setting out upon memorable careers. England won the three test matches in that year with ease.

Two years later the Cornish first of the tests, but success in the other two, and in 1890, England captained a side that made a side that

Reverend Martyn Henry Bateman

Instituted Vicar September 1962 to February 1969

(Graduate of Jesus College, Cambridge, and Clifton Theological College, Bristol.)
(Born in Beccles, Suffolk; served as chaplain to the Khuzistan Oil Fields, Iran;)
(Appointed Suffolk Archdeaconary Youth Chaplain, and President of the Diocesan)
(Evangelical Union.)

This period has been one in which the many changes in National Church life have also been noticeable in the Church in Charsfield.

There has been an awareness that children and young people are as important in the Christian Fellowship as every other person, and provision has been made for a full range of Sunday Schools, Scripture Union Classes, Confirmation Classes and Youth Fellowships, as well as an Adult Prayer Fellowship and Bible Study Group, based on the daily Bible Reading Fellowship Notes. Sunday Worship has been arranged so that all ages could take part, by the use of the Vicegerent for Sunday School during the Service Hour. Members of the Congregation have taken an active lead in all these organizations.

A fortnightly Service of Holy Communion with Hymns, alternating with Morning Prayer has proved acceptable; but after experimenting with the Series II Holy Communion Service in 1968, the P.C.C. decided to continue to use the 1662 Service until a revision of better quality shall be produced - ~~offer~~ a greater congregational participation in the reading of the prayers and the Scripture has been appreciated.

There has been a combined Church Womens Fellowship and Mothers Union meeting once a month at the Vicarage, to which all women have been made welcome. Many people have shown an interest in Missionary Work, supporting a C.M.S. link with Iran - Mr & Mrs Waterfield, formerly residents of Beccles that is connected with Charsfield through Sir John Levan. The work of Home Missions has been supported through the Church Pastoral Aid Society (with a particular interest in the work amongst spirit drinkers at Spitalfields Crypt in London, and children at St Jude's, London. Concern for the needy of the world has been expressed in generous giving to Christian Aid. (A Deanery Youth Association Walk in 1968 raising £240)

The financial support for the upkeep and local expenditure of the Church has been through weekly offerings and covenanted donations (a localised form of the scriptural principle of Stewardship). £100 being set aside each year for fabric repair; and the Diocesan Quota being £99 in 1968/69.

Interdenominational understanding between the Baptist Church and the Parish Church has been fostered through an annual meeting of P.C.C. Officials and Baptist Deacons. As well as Village Carol Singing and the Remembrance Service, United Services have been held on Easter Sunday and Whit Sunday evenings at each Church alternately to mark the fact that our essential unity is through the indwelling Spirit of our Risen Lord. (During this period the Baptist Church has appointed a former Lay-Reader from the Church of England as their part-time Pastor). A Parish Harvest Hawkey was held in 1967 in Mr Youngmans barn.

As housing conditions have improved, so has the standard of decoration of the Parish Church and the maintenance of the Churchyard - flowering trees being planted in memory of former Parishioners, and the grass retasoythed. A mid-nineteenth century pipe organ, from Fishtoft Parish Church in Lincolnshire, was installed in the musicians gallery in 1968, by Bishops of London & Exeter.

The "Secular ^{involvement} of the Church" has been noticeable in that many of the Church members take a leading part in the social life of the village; e.g. the over 60 "Forget-me-not" Club; the Flower Show Society; the Football Club and Youth Club. Most of these activities are reported in the Parish News that is duplicated and distributed monthly to nearly all parishioners.

A full account of Suffolk Village life will be found in a book published by Penguins, entitled "Acenfield- the life of an English Country Village", that has been brilliantly written by Mr Ronald Blythe - the Vice Chairman of the Parochial Church Council.

It has been a joy to live and work and worship in Charsfield - may God grant that what has been wrong in our ministry will be forgiven and forgotten, and what has been good will remain to the honour of our Lord Jesus Christ.

During the twelve years of Cecil Fox's incumbency, St. Peter's Church, Charsfield, continued as part of a combined Benefice with Hoo and Monewden, and he also served the parish of Debach where the church building had been declared redundant and then sold. Pews from Debach were brought to Charsfield and installed at the rear of the church, and a Riddel (a second World War memorial) from Debach now stands in the chancel.

The previous Vicar, Mastyn Bateman, had been a great ecumenist. Cecil Fox continued the warm relationship with the Baptist Chapel and when the Baptists had no pastor of their own he gave help when needed to their members. Combined services were held at least twice a year, and the formation of both the Girls' Brigade and the Boys' Brigade in 1977 was a joint enterprise with the Baptists.

Ronald Blythe served as Lay Elder during these years and his book "Akenfield" brought many visitors to the village and the church, including a number from the U.S.A.

When the director Peter Hall made the film "Akenfield" he chose local people to play the roles, and he did much of the filming in and around Charsfield.

The major social and economic events of the 1970's - the oil crisis of 1973, high inflation, Britain's membership of the European Common Market, the spread of computers and the microchip, - all made their impact on Charsfield. Felixstowe Dock became a major port, and British Telecom's research station was set up at Martlesham Heath. In 1974 St. Peter's close was developed and eighteen houses were built, bringing many new families to the village and to the church. Horizons broadened, and cooperation between the parishes in the Benefice increased.

The number of private motor cars increased greatly, and supermarkets and hypermarkets were opened in all the nearby towns. The village lost its bus service, and, one by one, ~~by~~ the village shops closed. The landscape suffered sadly in the late 1970's when a virulent form of Dutch Elm disease spread into Suffolk and killed most of the elm trees in the parish. Oil seed rape became a common crop with its vivid splashes of yellow among the more traditional crops.

Apart from regular church services, the Sunday School continued to be held, and there was Friday Fellowship for young people. The Mothers' Union met. Rogation Walks were revived, and two Parish Workups were held in the Fruit House at Charsfield Hall. For a short time there was no resident organist, but a visiting organist kept the tradition of music alive. There were organ recitals in the church, and the hillby singers gave a concert. In 1980 a children's choir was founded, affiliated to the Royal

School of Church Music, and they sang each Sunday morning and at the major festivals. Also in 1980 a project to provide the church with embroidered kneelers was launched. The designs were based on the flushwork frieze around the tower and porch, and all the artistic and practical preparations were made by a team of people within the parish. After three winters of embroidery, nearly fifty had been completed.

In spite of many closures of village schools elsewhere, Charsfield Voluntary-aided Church of England School continued to flourish with 30 - 40 pupils. (The building stands on land owned by the Diocese.) Cecil Fox served as chairman of the governors, and took a keen interest in the pupils and visited the two classes twice a week.

Many village societies continued to flourish, including the Forget-me-not club for the over-60s, the Tennis club, the CAOS (Charsfield Amateur Dramatic Society) and the Flower Show. In 1981 the BBC used the church and vicarage as the location for its film "Artemis 81". The crews of actors and technicians stayed for a week and both the church and village hall benefitted financially from the BBC's visit.

During 1975 extensive repairs were carried out to the Bell frame at considerable cost so that the bells could remain safely in the tower and continue to chime the clock. In 1978 the heating system was completely replaced except for a small amount of earlier pipe lines and the result was a great improvement in comfort for worshippers.

This was a period during which the church Commissioners made it clear that their future income

from sources other than donations given by parishioners would be inadequate to provide for all the expenditure they were being called upon to meet. In consequence it would be necessary for an increasing proportion of their total income to be forthcoming from the share provided by parishers, namely church members.

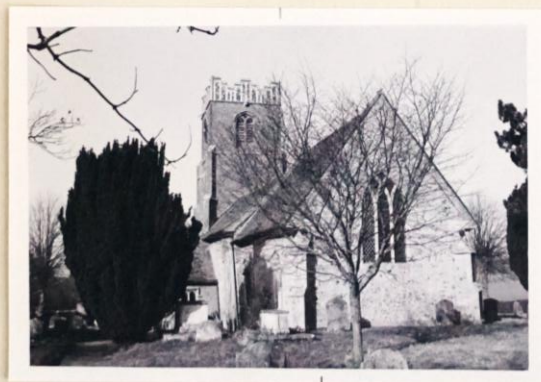

During the seven years of Jim Laurie's incumbency, St. Peter's Church continued as part of the United Benefice of Charsfield with Debach, Monewden, Hoo, Dallinghoo and Letheringham. Jim Laurie worked hard to make the Benefice a living reality and frequently conducted four services on a Sunday. He encouraged lay Readers, Lay Elders and other church members to assist and lead services. His own sermons, always thoughtful and clearly presented, were delivered (with few notes) from the steps of the chancel. A combined Benefice service was held once a month, in each church in turn. Cooperation increased between the parishes, and when Jim retired and left Suffolk over two hundred church members and friends attended a farewell Benefice party at Easton Farm Park.

The frequency of Family Communion services increased and children of all ages were welcomed. The Sunday School continued, and the children provided music and drama at the major festivals, and at the Christingle Service. Rogation weeks were held, and Harvest Festival Suppers, to which all parishioners were invited. The making of kneelers, begun in Cecil Fox's incumbency, continued and a further twenty-five were completed. The friendly relationship with the Baptist Chapel was maintained, and combined services were held at least twice a year, at Christmas

and Easter. A Summer fete was held each year at the Patronal Festival, both as a channel of Christian fellowship and as a means of raising money. Jim Laurie was a keen rider for the Benefice in the Historic Churches' Annual Sponsored Cycle Ride - a movement which started in Suffolk and spread to many other dioceses.

As Chairman of Governors of Charsfield village school, Jim was closely associated with its pupils. Together with the parents, he led a successful attempt to keep the school open when it was threatened with closure by the Local Education Authority. In 1990 there were 35 pupils on the School Roll.

Jim Laurie's wife, Joan, took a keen interest in local affairs and was a very able Secretary to the Parish Council. The last years of Jim's incumbency were saddened by Joan's serious illness; she died in January 1990.

A major programme of restoration and maintenance to the interior and exterior of St. Peter's Church became necessary, and between 1984 and 1989 repairs were made to the East Gable of the chancel, to the South porch, to the Tower roof and to the chancel and Nave windows. In 1986 both slopes of the Nave roof were retiled. The interior of the church was entirely redecorated in 1989 and new lighting was installed. The choir benches were re-arranged to provide more open space in the chancel, and the tiled floor in the chancel was extended.

Some grants towards the heavy expenditure on these repairs were received from English Heritage (Historic Buildings and Monuments Commission), the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust, and the Diocesan Church Buildings Committee, but the greatest part of the cost was met by gifts from church members and friends in the parish or outside, as by special fund-raising events. The parish continued to meet its

annual Diocesan Quota towards general expenses of the church of England. In 1990 the amount was £2857.

The Parochial Church Council took the decision to deposit for safe keeping, in the Diocesan Treasury at the Cathedral at Bury St. Edmunds, the priceless silver tazzas and flagon which were presented to the parish in the reign of Elizabeth I. They remain the property of St. Peter's but it is hoped that at the Cathedral they will be shown more often than has been possible at Charsfield.

Many village societies continued to flourish, including the Tennis Club, C.A.S. (Amateur Dramatic Society), the Flower Show, Women's Institute and Football Club (of which Jim Laurie was Chairman). The village still has the "Three Horseshoes" public house, the village school and the Garage. Jim and Joan Laurie lived in the Vicarage next to the church, although the future of this house is now in question. As a rural community, Charsfield became aware of some of the problems facing farmers in Europe, and of the possible conflict between the use and conservation of the countryside. Fields lying fallow reminded passers-by of the "set aside" policy.

The landscape was also affected by natural disasters. In the Great Storm of October 1987, hurricane-force winds swept through East Anglia and other parts of the country. The worst of the storm occurred at night so that the loss of life was small, but great swathes of forests and woods were felled like matchsticks, and parts of Charsfield were without electricity for over a week when a great oak in The Street fell on the overhead supply lines. Another storm in January 1990 caused further

damage to woods and trees throughout the country. A tree-planting programme has begun to fill the gaps left by the two storms.

There continues to be great interest in remembering past events in the parish. In 1987 a church member made a study of Charsfield field names, boundaries, houses and families from earliest evidence, through Domesday Book to the present time which was published as part of the "Deben Valley Place-name Survey", by the Suffolk local History Council.

The signature reveals that this was written by the **village historian, Margaret Elliott**, in co-operation with the Churchwardens and the PCC in May 1991 (after Jim had left).

The final paragraph mentions the **Deben Valley Place-Name Survey. Charsfield's own "green book"** (as it became known) was largely researched and produced by Margaret herself and it has remained an excellent resource for past village information.

“Richard Addington (full name: Gerald Richard Addington Hall) was born in West Byfleet, Surrey in 1938, and educated at Woking Grammar School. He was the second of five children, one elder brother and three younger sisters. One of his mother’s sisters was a member of the Anglican Community of the Sacred Passion which was founded to work in Tanzania. When Richard was 8, this aunt came to stay with them during home leave, and so enthused Richard with her account of life as a nurse in Africa, that he determined there and then that he would go to Tanzania when he grew up. He was 16 when he felt a calling to the priesthood; so from then on he anticipated a life of celibacy, as demanded of the missionaries in the Anglo-Catholic tradition of UMCA (Universities Mission to Central Africa). After gaining an M.A. degree in mathematics at Queen’s College, Oxford, he went on to read theology at Queen’s College, Birmingham. He obtained a World Council of Churches (WCC) scholarship and spent a year at the University of Legon, in Ghana, after which he was awarded an M.A. in theology from Birmingham University. This was followed by ordination in 1965. After a period at St Hilda’s, Leeds, he returned to Africa for six years from 1969 as a parish priest and also Chaplain of St Andrew’s Teacher Training College in Korogwe, Tanzania. Here he met his future wife, Mary, and they married in 1970. (By the time Richard got out to Tanzania, at the age of 31, UMCA had amalgamated with USPG (United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel), who did employ married missionaries. Times, and customs, do change; and he found himself one of only two English priests in the diocese, all the others, with the Bishop, were indigenous Tanzanians, for whom family life is so important. So, having gone to Africa a confirmed bachelor, he came home on leave three years later with a wife and two children! (Though he had had to ask permission of the Bishop to get married, this was gladly given.) Twins Nicholas and Rachel were born there in July 1971.

He returned to Britain in April 1975 and, later that year, he was instituted as Vicar of St Francis’s, Ipswich. He then moved to become Rector of Pakenham, Norton and Tostock (near Bury St Edmunds) and was instituted on 11th September 1981, serving until 1991. It was during his time there that he developed an interest in botany. (Never having lived in the (English) countryside until moving to Pakenham, Richard was amazed to discover just how many wild flowers there are, when he started walking his dog through the lanes and footpaths of west Suffolk. He bought himself a pocket-sized reference book which soon became well-thumbed as he referred to it many times on his walks. His botanical library grew as his knowledge of wild flowers spread to grasses, then to ferns. He would spend his days off recording for the Suffolk Biological Records Office, noting down systematically every flower that grew in the particular 2km x 2km tetrad that he was surveying. He became the most prolific recorder in Suffolk, and recorded a third of the area of Suffolk. He was very amused (and chuffed) to find himself mentioned twice in “The English Parson-Naturalist” by Patrick Armstrong, published in 2000.)

In 1991, he moved to St Peter’s, Charsfield (with Debach, Monewden, Hoo, Dallinghoo and Letheringham), where he became diocesan Warden of Readers and for a time served as Rural Dean of Loes. He was a member of the Bishop’s Council and the Diocesan Board of Finance and, in 1995, was made an Honorary Canon of St Edmundsbury Cathedral. He returned to Africa in 1997 for a three-month sabbatical, and then, with Mary, entertained several overseas bishops and their wives during the Lambeth Conference in 1998. In poor health for several years with the rare blood disease, Polycythaemia rubra vera, he retired from Charsfield in 1999 and moved to Melton. It was whilst he was serving in rural east Suffolk that he recognised the changing nature

of farming and the plight of small farmers as produce prices fell. When swine fever hit the Suffolk pig industry in 2000, he identified the need for financial help for farmers. By then too ill to do anything actively, he shared his ideas with the diocesan agricultural chaplain, and this led to the foundation of the Addington fund in East Anglia. A year later, when the trustees were expecting to wind up the fund, foot-and-mouth struck, and the original Addington fund became the basis for a national appeal which was re-launched as the Arthur Rank Centre-Addington fund. His principles of providing financial support for farmers coupled with pastoral care live on to this day.

Richard had a keen brain, and although his physical health was not very good during his latter years, with his love of Mathematics he kept his mind active by studying Accounting Techniques. He qualified at NVQ Level 3 before becoming ill in 1999, then achieved Level 4 in 2001. He had hoped that perhaps during his retirement he could offer help to any parish treasurers that were struggling with their responsibilities; but that was not to be. Having been Governor at several schools during his years in Suffolk, Richard had a great admiration for teachers, and had served several times as a Ofsted Lay Inspector of schools.

He died in 2002 at the age of 64.

Although there is no signature, it is likely that this account was produced by village historian, Margaret Elliott, in conjunction with **Mary Addington, Richard's wife.**

One fact not mentioned was that Richard introduced the “**Roving Supper**” to Charsfield, i.e where different couples come together for each course of a meal (starter, main, dessert). At this period, after the dessert course, everyone converged on Charsfield vicarage for a final cup of coffee.

Richard and Mary were the last to live at the vicarage before the Church of England sold it to private owners in the early 2000s.
